**SUBJECT: Narcotics Search Warrant**

On 04/20/2009 The Colony Special Response Team and Detectives from the Criminal Investigations Division executed a narcotics search warrant in the 3900 Blk of West Northwest Highway Dallas, TX. The search warrant stems from an investigation by narcotics detectives from The Colony Police Department, who were able to infiltrate a heroin ring that was the main supplier for The Colony and surrounding areas. Undercover operations yielded heroin being sold and distributed to young adults in The Colony. Through these operations, narcotic detectives were able to get a search/arrest warrant for the residence in Dallas and the source of the heroin being distributed in our city. The search warrant was executed without injury to anyone. Two individuals located inside the residence were arrested. They are identified as:

- Elizabeth Galdean      **Charged with:**  
2 counts of Endangering a Child.  
1 count of Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity (Distribution of Heroin).  
1 count of Manufacturing/Delivery of Controlled Substance(Cheese Heroin).  
Currently being held on \$84,000.00 Bond.
  
- Gabriel Gomez      **Charged with:**  
1 count of Engaging in Organized Criminal Activity (Distribution of Heroin).  
1 count of Manufacturing/Delivery of Controlled Substance(Cheese Heroin).  
Currently being held on \$75,000.00 Bond.

Several grams of Cheese Heroin were seized along with other paraphernalia. Cheese Heroin is a mixture of Tylenol P.M and raw heroin so it can be snorted. This form of heroin has caused teenage deaths in the metroplex, and has surfaced here in The Colony. Parents are advised to be on the lookout for this type of substance, since overdoses with cheese is very likely. Parents should note anyone with large amounts of Tylenol PM or similar product in the possession of teenagers and young adults. Most of the heroin that has surfaced in The Colony is black tar heroin, which is cooked and injected into the bloodstream through a hypodermic needle. Withdrawal from black tar heroin is often severe and can be fatal. Therefore, parents should also be aware of individuals in possession of hypodermic needles, who would not normally require the usage of them. The Colony Police Department is diligently working to keep this and all types of drugs out of our community.
